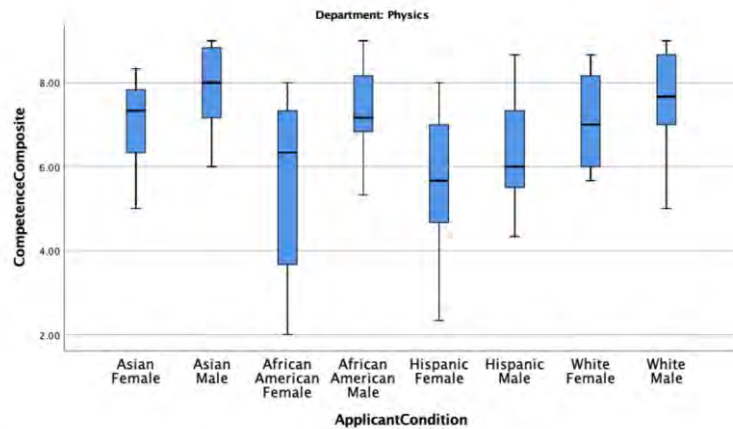


Figure 4. Boxplot illustrating distribution of Physics faculty competence ratings

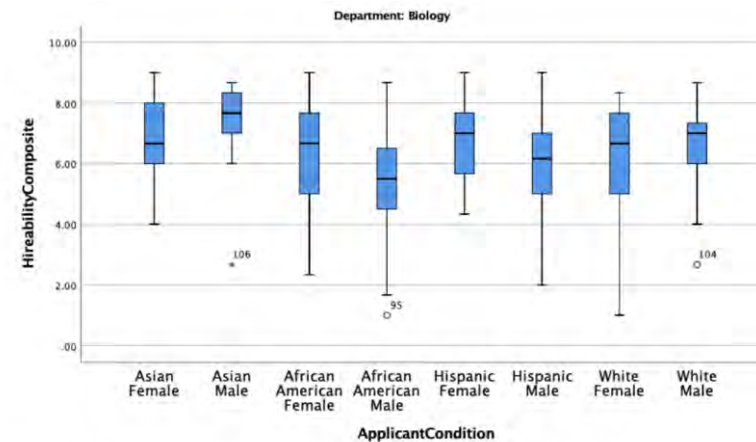


Figure 3. Boxplot illustrating distribution of Biology faculty hireability ratings
